TOH Annual Community Forum by Hank Kniskern

The 2025 TOH Annual Form was held at the Library on May 22. The panel members were City Council Chair (Mayor) Charlie Holder; our Ward 2 Council Rep Lynn Ceglie; and Teresa Brean, the Director of the city's new Department of Resilience and Sustainability. The panel members -- Charlie, Lynn and Teresa -- were very informative and candid. A BIG Thank You. About 45 members attended. In preparation for the forum, community members submitted questions that were categorized as Safety, Planning or Updates:

<u>Safety</u>: Traffic speed and volume were concerns, especially on Rhode Island Ave, Ayrault, Kay Street. Response: There are several tools available to mitigate speed – speed screen, cameras (majority of attendees said they would like these deployed) and police radars. The city has conducted a city-wide traffic study. A suggestion was made that TOH form a small ad hoc group to work with the city traffic experts to get more data, assess the tools available and support the City for trial sites. Teresa Crean also presented the methodology the City uses in determining the sequence of road repairs.

<u>Planning</u>: There are several planning initiatives underway, many under the direction of the Resiliency and Sustainability Department. Major ones are the Comprehensive Land Use Plan, Easton's Beach, Cliff Walk and Perrotti Park renovation. The Navy Hospital and the Bridge Realignment land have run into complications but are still active. The new Ann Street pier is nearly completed. The budgets for these initiatives have not been finalized. The City has hired an experienced full-time grant writer to seek ways to obtain grant funds for the city.

The Comprehensive Land Use Planning Commission will begin later this year, with a lot of resident participation. A detailed demographic analysis will be done to characterize our population base, housing, income, commercial base, etc. There will be some comparative studies of communities like Newport, the intent being to uncover unique solutions and best practices. This Plan is another opportunity for TOH residents to actively participate. More information will be forthcoming later this summer as the city pulls together its advisory committee.

Staying Informed: The city has improved its proactive communication to residents.

Online monthly newsletter: You can sign-up for the City's monthly online newsletter, **The Current**, using the link if you are not already receiving it. The newsletter is very good, you'll find it interesting.

Updates:

- Newport for all Ages is a program designed to influence municipal planning to improve the safety of all individuals, such as more visible cross walks and sidewalk leveling. The city is now looking for a person to manage this program.
- The City has approval for 1,000 residents for a **trial project to expand composting**. This is not only worth trying for environmental reasons but also to reduce the increasing cost of trash hauling.
- Other updates were on the Open Space Initiative, Easton's Beach and Cliff Walk repairs. For these, check the City's web site for meetings and updates since these are very active right now. Teresa reminded everyone that the city has an array of GIS digital maps that can be downloaded.
- There are important workshops taking place in June for "Easton's Beach: Planning for a Resilient Future". For more information please see the beautifully detailed website at:

Finally, as a neighborhood association, we will try to actively engage with the city as ad hoc volunteers and participants. This is especially important for the Comprehensive Land Use Plan. TOH members have always been and remain active on important City commissions and committees such as the Energy & Environment, Trust & Investment, Beach and Waterfront Commissions to just mention a few.

Membership by Anne Marie Biernacki – Smith

It's been a busy start to the year in terms of communication with our membership!

In February of 2025, the Board and Committee Chairs assembled an online survey that was emailed to our membership. We had a response rate of about 25% of the membership, which is a not atypical and quite acceptable number for this kind of thing.

Questions and selected responses included:

- how people found out about our neighborhood association ~84% were neighbor recommendations,
- what kinds of activities and benefits of membership were most appealing ~66% responded with the main social events (holiday party, garden party etc) and ~49% cited the general interest events (walking tours, landmark tours, boat trip etc.),
- what has been of most benefit more than 63% of the membership reported new friendships and social activities,
- whether they've recommended membership to anyone else 75% have done so (keep up the good work!),


- what opportunities to get more involved or volunteer might be of interest,
- what kinds of member communications are most impactful, including the website, and lastly,
- how the organization can serve member needs in the best way possible.

We are grateful for the candid and thoughtful responses, and – as noted in our Community Chair's update - spent considerable time discussing these results and how we can apply them to maintaining a strong and active neighborhood association.

(Guest) Historian's Corner

A historical nugget about our neighborhood, provided by a (very) longtime neighborhood resident: The area now occupied by Luce Park at the corner of Kay Street and Rhode Island Avenue was open space until around 1910. For several years between 1905 and 1910, a baseball team called the Newport Trojans used the area as their practice field. The Trojans were a semi-pro team that played major and minor league teams from other cities, especially from "blue law" New York, Connecticut and Massachusetts, which did not allow Sunday play at that time. Those teams, with sizable numbers of fans in tow, would take a train or steamship to Newport, play a game, and leave that night (after suitable festivities, no doubt). The Trojans played in Wellington Park into the teens and 20's, and then Cardines Field when it was built.

Charting A Strategy for TOH's Future by Hank Kniskern

The TOH Board is developing strategies to increase membership and engagement, focusing on community connection and participation.

The demographics of our neighborhood have changed since 2020; For example, the average member age has gotten older, and new house purchases have often been for summer residency or by investors. As noted in the Membership section above, the online member survey provided helpful feedback and suggestions.

The TOH Board had several demanding half-day sessions as they worked through the process. The guiding concept for the Board involved assessing strengths and weaknesses, external factors affecting the organization, and its mission statement and by-laws. The group focused on the concept of *TOH's Value Proposition*: Why would a resident want to join (and remain in) the TOH? The answer tended to center on a feeling of "connectiveness" not only with neighbors, but also with the larger Newport community -- a sense of safety, of belonging, participating, being informed, helping others, learning, and contributing to a greater good.

The following is a summary of recommendations and implementation:

- Keep the Summer Garden Party, Holiday Party, TOH City Council Annual Forum, and the Annual Membership Meeting and all the other recurring Events. Make these more personal by reaching out to immediate neighbors. Encourage all members to use the Forum on the TOH Website to add events they see of interest or wish to lead such as a movie night.
- Create a "TOH Welcome Letter" from the Membership Chair which articulates the benefits of belonging to the TOH. (That is in addition to the Introduction Letter from the President on the About Page of the Website.)
- Encourage more interpersonal engagement rather than defaulting to the convenience of texting.
- · Re-energize the "TOH Historic Committee"
- Continue the Beautification projects (e.g. Luce Park) as an event and think about other beautification ideas.
- Increase neighborhood connectedness by utilizing member "concentrations" (groups of several members clustered in a one or two block area). This can be facilitated with the Membership Directory that is sorted by Street Address found in the Association Materials Group on the TOH Website.

Look into supporting an area non-profit on a multi-year basis.
