

Brief Note About our 2025 Holiday Party Charity

Martin Luther King Community Center

Did you know that the MLK Community Center supports thousands of Newport County residents every year? With more than 25 programs focused on education, hunger relief, and community support, neighbors like you help make our community stronger and more resilient.

Last year alone, thanks to generous people like you, the MLKCC served more than 8,700 individuals. Together, we provided 1.3 million meals, awarded over \$237,000 in scholarships for high-quality Pre-K education, distributed 282,650 pounds of fresh produce, and ensured that 1,320 children received holiday gifts.

We are pivoting our focus from non-perishables to the greatest need which is toys for the children in our community. What is needed most right now:

- New, unwrapped medium to large-sized toys (infants to age 11) (\$35 \$40 range suggested if one can manage it)
- \$25 increment gift cards for older children (12+) from local retailers (Walmart, TJ Maxx, Marshalls, Old Navy, and Ulta Beauty preferred).
- Financial contributions are always also welcome
 - Checks made out to the MLKCC or donations using the QR code below both work. Please mark the comments "TOH" or "Top of the Hill" to be included in our association holiday donation drive.

We'll be collecting the toys and any financial contributions at the party. Receipts will be provided for financial contributions.

In a community like ours, every child deserves access to good food, high-quality Pre-K education, and the joy of holiday gifts. Together, we can make sure families have the support they need.

TOH Community Committee – Hank Kniskern

In our October TOH annual meeting, we summarized the traditional community engagement initiatives and new areas of collaborative interest based on the new board's strategy. The theme was that the TOH organization is a community within a community – Newport. Individuals join TOH to engage with neighbors, to experience warmth of belonging, sharing, helping and participating in the abundance of experiences Newport offers.

You've probably noticed the speed limit sign and radar feedback screen on the west bound lane of Kay Street near Everett. This is partly a result of our May <u>community forum</u> safety discussion with Mayor Charlie Holder and 2nd Ward Councilor Lynn Ceglie.

There are over 25 TOH residents that serve on city boards, commissions and groups such as Trust and Investment, Energy, Cliff Walk, and Waterfront commissions. These residents provide professional expertise to the City.

The **10-year Comprehensive Land Use Plan** initiative will get underway in earnest in early 2026. It is a major effort where civic participation is essential. More information on this will be coming. This planning will certainly help us get a better understanding of the changing demographics of our neighborhood.

Our new TOH **police liaison is Officer Frank Pirri**. He is also the liaison officer for the Point Neighborhood. He can be reached (in non-emergency situations) at 845-5863. We will invite him to some of our upcoming meetings. In the meantime, they are collecting winter jackets, especially smaller sizes for school age children. The jackets can be dropped off at the police department.

At our annual meeting, one suggestion from the membership was to increase opportunities to informally mingle in smaller informal venues. It was also suggested that we ask participants to bring a few non-perishables or canned goods to any events. We can collect and distribute them to organizations in need.
